 - : Fraser Park Primary School opened in 1975 at the Murray Bridge South Primary School Campus and opened at the present site in 1977.

2. Students (and their welfare)

General characteristics:

Fraser Park Preschool-6 School is committed to providing a safe, secure, supportive and caring learning environment. Emphasis is placed on student involvement in school decision making and on students taking responsibility for their choices. Examples of student centred programs include: Sharing Circle, Student Forums, formal classroom and yard values based policies, Restorative Justice, and Social Skills programs. Values Education.

• Care programs:

The Wellbeing coordinator provides ongoing in and out of class support as well as conducting family workshops. The Wellbeing coordinator supports the student referral processes and liases with town support agencies. In addition the Wellbeing coordinator provides a valued leadership resource.

There is also fruit in every class, every day.

Pastoral Support Worker:

The school has 1 Non Denominational Pastoral Support Worker who is available 2 days per week to support students and their families.

• Student management:

The Schools Behaviour Code provides a framework for managing student behaviour and creating a safe, orderly, productive and successful learning community. The "School Behaviour Code" describes a range of specific strategies developed to meet the varying needs of students in the school setting and the different needs and expectations of the local community (families, students, staff, wider community and service providers).

<u>APPROPRIATE BEHAVIOUR IS ENCOURAGED WITH THE FOLLOWING:</u> Social skills lessons relating to: Conflict resolution, Harassment, antiracism, peer relationships. Using School behaviours.

Restorative Justice Process is used Preschool-6 and regular Sharing Circles are held, often attended by the Wellbeing Coordinator or Administration staff.

Contextual Influences

Fraser Park Primary School and Preschool is situated in the river community of Murray Bridge.

The student population come from a wide range of cultures. We pride ourselves in working in partnership with families and the wider community to support personalised learning for all students. On site is colocated with the Learning Together Program which is aimed at developing improved access to programs and literacy skills for families of children 0-3 in the Murray Bridge area.

VISION: Learning for the Future

Core Business

Our purpose is to plan, teach and evaluate a balanced curriculum so that each child has the best chance to develop new skills and learnings. Within a happy, healthy and safe environment students will be, creative and able to grow physically, socially and emotionally. Students and their families having direct input into school based decisions.

The National Australian Curriculum provides the framework for programming, assessment and reporting.

Core business is supported by:

Active participation by staff in decision-making

- OHSW structures to facilitate a safe working environment
- Team structures that support individual student needs through referral and counselling services and provide intervention strategies where necessary
- Collaborative Unit teaching structures and whole school support structures for class and behaviour management strategies

Preschool (Pulyeri) Core Business

Developing student skills through a play based curriculum is an essential aspect of Early Childhood learning in the Preschool. Planning for play and providing facilities for play are the central components in developing a curriculum that integrates all levels of a child's development and reflects the guiding principles of the Early Years Learning Framework. This curriculum framework forms the focus for curriculum development.

4. Curriculum

- Subject offerings
 - : Teachers use The National Curriculum as a basis for programming and assessment. The school is focused on an inclusive and balanced curriculum.
- Special needs
 - : A student Review Team has been established to discuss and plan for student needs especially for students identified as at risk.

All students have One Plans.

- Special curriculum features
 - : Restorative Justice, Values Based Behavioural Codes of Conduct.
- Teaching methodology
 - : We provide an inclusive curriculum for all students, to address their individual learning needs and provide maximum learning outcomes and personal development opportunities.

Contextual based learning is a high priority. Teachers are encouraged to use critically reflective practices, take risks with methodology and to continually monitor and assess; what works, what doesn't and for which groups of students. Understandings of the practical application of social justice principles are key elements of teaching.

- Assessment procedures and reporting
 - : Individual portfolios are used by all teachers in the school and the preschool to regularly access and report on student progress. This is further supported by individual interviews. Translators are supplied for NESB students if required.

Students are also involved in feedback and families are encouraged to add comments in portfolios.

Student data is collected and monitored regularly. Records of results and recommendations are included in Student folders. Identity Webs for all students.

6. Staff (and their welfare)

- Staff profile
 - : Permanent appointments have made our staff stable and skilled ensuring strong sustained community relationships.
- Leadership structure
 - : Principal, Wellbeing Coordinator 0.8.
- Staff support systems
 - : The Wellbeing Coordinator and Principal support and monitor Behaviour Management issues, Social Skills programs, Affirmative Action programs and contextual based learning. There is a Social committee.
- Performance Management
 - : All staff has regular Performance Management meetings with 2-way agendas.
- Access to special staff
 - :Speech Pathologist, Hearing Impaired personnel, CAMHS, DCP,SSS, and other agencies, DFE project officer support are available to support staff in their programs in negotiation with Principal and Wellbeing Coordinator.

Whole School Workshops

: Whole School Workshops every Wednesday 3-30-5 pm to support the development of staff and whole school processes.

8. School Facilities

• Buildings and grounds

: Fraser Park was opened in 1975. The site, of 3.96ha includes hard play areas, oval, tennis courts and car park. The site is attractively laid out and adjoins a Council reserve. The School is in an area of predominantly Housing Trust homes and semi-rural enterprises. The school is almost exclusively DEMAC construction and the teaching areas are open design. A brick Gymnasium/Hall is a valuable resource.

Carefully planned expenditure of Asset Management Plan Funding, is gradually refurbishing the school with new carpets, ceilings, lights, painting and additional student facilities, along with school murals

Cooling

: All buildings are air-conditioned.

Specialist facilities

: There is a well equipped Physical Education room. The Resource Centre is well resourced, with children's books, teacher resources and AV equipment. The library also has 4 computers with access to the Internet. The Resource Centre data is managed by the Bookmark management system and is continually upgraded.

• Student facilities

: Information Technology skills are supported by a Computer room. Students have access to the Internet and have e-mail addresses. A canteen is located in the Administration section of the school and is open Wednesday to Friday each week.

Staff facilities

: Staff room and staff toilets are in the main Admin building.

8. School Operations

Decision making structures

: Fraser Park values whole school community participation in Decision Making. The Decision Making Policy is continually reviewed and redrafted to meet DFE and school requirements. Roles and responsibilities of formal groups and individuals are clearly defined and a strong emphasis is placed on inclusivityThe Governing Council play an active role in decision making eg Finance, Grounds, Canteen, PAC, Curriculum groups, Student Forum. Fraser Park values open communication between all members of the community. The Governing Council has been restructured to facilitate increased decision making by families.

• School financial position

: In 2021 approximately 98% of students were eligible for School Card benefits.

The School is located in a low socio-economic area, and is dependent on Commonwealth and State funds to resource the school. The Global Budget is managed by a Level 2 Finance SSO in collaboration with the Principal and Governing Council Finance Committee. The School Canteen contributes additional funding. School finances are monitored by the Finance sub-committee of School Council and operated through a consolidated account. Staff members take responsibility for Budget preparation and spending in Curriculum areas, using consultative processes to ensure Staff and Students needs are met.

Special funding

: Commonwealth and State funds are critical for providing our school with access and participation for all students.

9. Local Community

General characteristics

: Fraser Park Preschool-6 School's enrolment comes mainly from the urban area of Murray Bridge, with a small component from surrounding rural areas. The Murray Bridge community includes people from Aboriginal, Sudanese, Philippine and other non-English speaking backgrounds. There is a high level of mobility in the community, reflected in the school enrolment patterns.

Parent and community involvement

: The Governing Council is the formal structure for family participation.

Families support classes in program delivery and excursions.
