Principal's Piece

Friday's student-free day saw staff participate in training from the Literacy Guarantee Unit facilitated by Kathy. The day enables us to refine the instructional routine part of our morning literacy block. What became very evident to me was that it was critical students arrived and started learning at 8:45 am. Several students are arriving late and still need to complete the critical first hour of the day. This is where the students participating in the instructional routine learn the skills to read and spell. Our school attendance is 80%, and we want this to increase. At 8:45 am, our attendance is closed to 65 - 70%. Students must arrive on time to engage in this learning. Engaging daily will support students in building their literacy knowledge and understanding.

I have been observing in classes this week, and it has been great to see the learning. Students across all classes are confidently engaging in the literacy instructional routine. Many students have shared their learning with me. I am super impressed with the reception blending their CVC (3 letters) words. I also engaged in reading the upper primary students' persuasive writing. There were many convincing reasons to change the reader's perception.

All classes have engaged in Maths Chats, and students participate highly. I enjoyed sitting and watching the high energy, enthusiasm and participation in the classroom. Mr Amos' class quickly recognised the number of objects flashed on the board, and they could explain their reasoning. Mr Grantham's class have been busy practising their skipping counting of larger numbers. What fantastic learning. This term, our assemblies are on Thursday due to Auskick Friday afternoons. It has been great for our students to share their learning. Last week's assembly was especially special as our year six students received their year six t-shirts and jumpers. The students designed the back of the tshirt and jumper—a big thank you to the governing council for financing these. Governing council and staff have been busy fundraising, and this is an example of where the money goes.

Sue and Kylie have been at it again, organising another fabulous fundraiser. This time it was pizza scrolls and milkshakes. The smell from the canteen was amazing. The students and staff loved the scrolls and milkshakes. We should keep this one on the list—a big thank you to Sue and Kylie for all your efforts.

As the days get short and the weather gets cooler, it is essential to continue attending school. Yes, the mornings can be challenging, but we must get moving and arrive at school. Our updated attendance policy was approved last week at our governing council meeting. We have created a flow chart for families, which is attached to the newsletter. Friendships

Friendships are **important for all children**, including children with autism.

Friendships help all children:

- feel that they fit in with and belong to their peer group
- feel good about themselves
- learn about getting along with others and sorting out social problems.

For children with autism, good friendships can help them do better at school. Good friendships in childhood might also mean fewer social and emotional difficulties for them later in life.

Characteristics of healthy friendships:

- Kind
- · Caring
- Loyal
- Sharing
- · Supportive
- · Respectful of each other
- · Valuing each other and the friendship

In a healthy friendship, a child or young person should feel:

- · Comfortable to be themselves
- Valued
- Cared about
- Heard
- Understood
- Able to share their passions and interests, likes and dislikes



Keeping Friends

It can be hard to keep friendships going for many children and young people. They may need support with how and when to contact or interact with friends to maintain a friendship.

However, individuals may also need support to understand why and when to end a friendship. If friends become unkind or disrespectful, then they should no longer be seen as friends.

Tips for supporting successful friendships

- Provide opportunities to do things the individual likes
- Express interest in the child or young person's interests
- Help them to find age appropriate people who share some of their interests to connect with, either online or in person
- Help the child or young person to understand the difference between healthy and unhealthy friendships
- Role model and talk about healthy friendships

Greetings from your Chaplain, Ian. Last week I was away at a conference for two days on Tuesday 16-5 and Wed 17-5, put on by my employer Schools Ministry Group, (SMG) in Adelaide. It was an amazing time with other Chaplains from all over SA as we met together with our manager's and support people. There was plenty of time to listen and reflect on our roles as Chaplain's in our schools. Time together to compare notes about what we are up to and share our stories. Our new CEO Graham Stephenson of SMG shared his vision and goals going forward with a passion and commitment that inspired all those present.

As part of ongoing care for the school community at Fraser Park PS there will be a free Chaplain's Care Barbecue on Thursday 1-6-2023 at lunchtime with Aunty Trish Lloyd helping out. This Sunday is Pentecost Sunday, 28th May 2023. At 7.00 pm there is a combined Christian churches Pentecost Service at the Church of Christ, 32 Seventh Street, MB with a shared supper afterwards. It is a celebration of the start of the Christian church in Jerusalem. It is a Christian Festival celebrating the coming of the Holy Spirit in the form of tongues of fire on the disciples of Jesus heads. It coincides with the Jewish festival of Shavuoth, the festival of celebrating the start of the wheat harvest. There were many people in Jerusalem at Pentecost and through what the Apostle Peter had to share 3500 people became believers in Christ which was the start of the modern church.

The fifth dimension of school chaplaincy is Community Engagement which involves developing links between the school and it's, community, working with school-based support staff, community-based organisations, Churches, agencies, services and other networks. 



Learning Snapshot: Growing things

Over the last month or two, our children have noticed that our new river bed had begun to grow clover plants, especially in places that stayed wet. We started to question what plants need to survive, and last week Chaplain I an took us to the school veggie patch to have a lesson in Gardening! We talked about seeds and learned how to plant them.

We have also made some zip lock bags with wet cotton balls and more seeds, which are taped to a sunny window in preschool. As the bag is clear, we will be able to use these to watch what is happening under the ground, as our broad beans start to sprout!
