They are going to MB South Primary School and have settled in well. So, if you wonder why Ian looks tired I am. At 65 years of age we are not meant to be parents.

Parental Supervision Online Gaming – Are we allowing our Children to Be Harmed.

I write this article out of love and concern for the children at Fraser Park. I have been doing some research about video games which can be as addictive as illicit drugs, alcohol and sugar. In particular the video game 'Fortnite' is rated M 15+ and is harmful for children under this age to play this game. Basically, this game is being played at the same time by kids and adults at the same time as you are dropped in to an island/map to build structures, hunt for weapons and equipment. You compete until the last one standing wins. So in effect as parents if you allow your children to play this game you are allowing adult strangers in to your child's world, into your child's bedroom, who don't care what they say or do in the game in an effort to win.

Up to the age of 15 years and beyond, a child's brain is still developing and playing Fortnite or similar video games can be very harmful. Three signs/symptoms to look for. 1. Does your child lose control when gaming and has behavioural issues around gaming. 2. Prioritizing gaming to the extent that it takes precedence over other activities and interests. (Including not wanting to go to school). 3. Continuing to game despite negative effects on school, family life, health and hygiene, family relationships. As parents/caregivers we are called to be responsible and to protect our children in love from harm. Age-appropriate video games are much better for children and the amount of time on devices needs to be managed. As parents it is not our role to be popular or friends with our children but to be loving, caring and to look after them in all aspects of life.

To finish off on a positive note. The Bend Motorsport Excursion this Friday 18th August is going to be a great day. Thank you to Kimberly our principal for organizing this and Michael for working out the logistics of the day. Well done to those students who have done the right thing at school and are able to come.

KUNGARI

This term is phonics we have continued learning about different diagraphs for the Reception's and split-vowel diagraphs for the Years 1's. As a general reminder here is some of the vocabulary, we use during phonics lesson across all classes

Cheat Sheet for Parents

Phoneme: The smallest unit of speech sound in a word. The word 'shark' has three phonemes (sh) (ar) (k).

Grapheme: The letter/s that spell the sounds in words. The word 'shark' has three graphemes: sh, ar, k. The word dog has three graphemes: d, o, g.

Phonology: The study of the sound structure in language.

Phonics: A method of teaching people to read by matching sounds (phonemes) with symbols (letters). Phonics has the strongest evidence base there is when it comes to teaching reading and spelling.

Morpheme: The smallest unit of meaning in a word Eg: 'sharks' has 2 morphemes shark + s. The base word is 'shark' and the suffix 's' indicates plurality.

Morphology is the study of meaningful word parts

Sounding Out (decoding): Saying the phonemes (sounds) out loud to get to an accurate pronunciation (and recognition) of an unknown word.

Blending: Saying the sounds quickly, or stretching the sounds to hear the word.

Segmenting: Hearing a word and breaking it into its separate phonemes (sounds) to spell it.








Math Melodrama






Literacy Lookout
